FROM CINDY



Dear Cape Cod Children's Place Community Members,

It is hard to know where to begin when trying to articulate what this past year's experience has been for us here at CCCP. Along with the rest of the world, we found ourselves living in uncertain times that no one could have imagined or prepared for.

I believe Cape Cod Children's Place was able to respond and meet the challenges, not because we had a crystal ball that foretold the future, but because of the mission that continues to guide us in our everyday work strengthening families.

Cape Cod Children's Place builds resiliency, strength, and skills in Cape Cod children and families through free family support services and affordable high quality early education and care programs. Our vision is a community where all children grow up safe, nurtured and supported so they can achieve their full potential.

In March of 2020, we immediately adopted a new "norm," as we re-learned to pivot with each new challenge that presented itself. We knew we needed to continue to serve and support families. We needed to practice what we preach, and re-learned and practiced resiliency and flexibility. We were forced to change the way we had always done things. We became experts on zoom; we made sure that the human connection was our priority and remained committed to having a person answering the phones in these chaotic and uncharted times.

Most of all, we did not give up. We continued to show up, for ourselves and for our CCCP families. We listened to them as they shared about how their basic needs were going unmet, and we calmed their fears and anxieties over unknown impacts to their children. We tapped into our creative world and found new ways to connect with our families and community organizations.

All of us have tried to identify and share silver linings from this experience. Families realized how strong they were and how resourceful they could be. We created even greater collaborations with our fellow non-profit partners, making sure that we could help families from whatever point of entry they came to us. We discovered new levels of generosity and strength within our community. There were moments when my breath was taken away, moments of emotion and gratitude.

We now hope that there is light at the end of this long tunnel. Some of the new ways will stay with us, making access easier for our families to attend our parent education and support groups. We all look forward to a time when we can greet each other without masks and see each other with new eyes. Until then, we will continue to follow our mission of creating a more just, Inclusive, and welcoming world for those who wish to engage with us.



FROM LIZ

Dear Cape Cod Children's Place Community,



When given the task to sit down and write about the last twelve months, I sat at my desk and became flooded with memories and emotion. Strength. Friendship. Support. Connection. Hope. Of course, words to describe the unknown which all of us were forced to embark on were on my mind as well, but what continued to stand out to me was the ability to stand together – apart – as a community, personal and professional, throughout all of it.

The biggest concern on my mind as Head of School, and on the minds of the CCCP teaching team, during the public health crisis, was and is: how do we connect with our youngest students in the same way as "before"? The most essential and critical piece of everything we have done and want to continue to do is to build a relationship with the children in our classrooms and their families. We knew that reopening our school doors during a pandemic would be a monumental task, but we also knew we would do it with love in our hearts, and convey that in our eyes behind the masks. So we took on one of the most important challenges of our careers.

By all accounts since our school doors reopened on August 31, 2020, our standards of safety exceeded state requirements, and our early learning center is thriving. Yes, the demands from regulations are stricter, the emotional toll is stronger, the financial cost is larger, but to have the privilege to watch infants, toddlers, and preschool age children learn to navigate school with masks and physical distancing with such courage and flexibility, to witness these children learn how to articulate their needs and feelings in new ways because they cannot always see facial cues; and to learn how to connect with families in different ways due to restrictions placed on how we are allowed to do that, has been in its own way, a gift. I believe we have slowed down to listen more intently, to observe more keenly, and to take extra moments to enjoy the smallest and sometimes quietest moments with those around us.

We have also taken on self-reflecting and questioning what our role is as early childhood education teachers in acknowledging the inequities in our country. How can we teach social justice within our school. We are teaching ourselves and learning what this looks like within early learning classrooms and what changes we need to make within our philosophy and curricula. This process will be ongoing and ever-changing and we are proud to take on this new chapter of growth.

While 2020 was an experience none of us are likely to forget, it also was an experience which reminded us why we chose to teach. We believe in the magic of early childhood. We are excited to be back doing what we do best and look forward to many more years of being a part of the magic.

INSPIRATION

Tomas Tolentino, From Parent to Program Facilitator to Community Leader



I grew up in Northern New Jersey, and for my whole life, 1 week every summer we vacationed on Cape Cod.

In 2010 I had the opportunity to make it my home. I have lived in West Yarmouth for over 11 years now and wherever I have lived I have tried to be a supporting member of the community. My son was born in November of 2013. From the day he was born I knew that I had to do everything I could to ensure he had opportunities I did not. I knew his success was going to be helped if I was an involved parent regardless of my busy career.

The first program I did with him was the Dad and Baby Pizza group at Cape Cod Hospital with Paul Melville. I attended that for over a year, and I even had the opportunity to lead a program on baby Sign Language, as I had learned some and taught my son the basics. As we outgrew that group I decided to join what people called the "Mom Groups". I manage hotels and work weekends so I take mid-week days off. Tuesday has always been Dad and Son day for us and I always forced myself to do something productive, educational, or fun on Tuesdays with him.

I started going to playgroups sponsored by Cape Cod Children's Place and run by Miss Mary. As a family we did evening play group focused on International Culture and food with Miss Gabby. When Gabby left, Miss Mary spoke to me and asked my interest in taking over a class just like it. That is where Book and Cook came to fruition. I have been facilitating for over 3 years now. Throughout my programming time I had the opportunity to meet Cindy Horgan and attend several of her amazing classes. I have attended Potty Training 101, Positive Development, Raising Healthy Boys, Dining on a Budget, and a class on Screen Time and its effects. I learned many things and have become a great father due to all the lessons, feedback, and honesty I learned through the classes and other parents.

I also learned I was not alone. Several years ago to move away from the stigma of "Mom Groups" I started Dad and Me, a monthly group geared for dads to help allow them to spend time in play groups and to help dedicate at least 1 hour to spend with their children with just dad and to give mom a break. Since my time doing programming I have attended Dennis Yarmouth CFCE quarterly meetings, the 10-town CFCE council meetings, and the Cape Cod Children's Advisory board. On top of my work with the DY CFCE and Cape Cod Children's Place I also serve on the Station Avenue PTO as the treasurer elect. I also recently joined the Dennis Yarmouth School Committee Diversity and Inclusion Subcommittee and am a candidate for the open 1-year seat of the DY (Yarmouth) School Committee. I appreciate all that CCCP has done for me and I hope others who appreciate their programs will get involved and share all the great programs and things that Cape Cod Children's Place has to offer.

INNOVATION WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED

Virtual parent education programs and community council meetings enjoyed greater participation in a Zoom format than in person. This adaptation will inform our evening programming plans going forward in that it reduces logistical barriers and expenses such as food and child care.

Our longtime parent-child engagement specialists, Lucy Gilmore and Mary Wilson, quickly adapted our in person "play and learn" child development programming to creative family home activity kits with companion virtual activities and Zoom show and tell. While program participation was reduced to accommodate a virtual medium, the family support and adept child development teaching skills used were outstanding! Creative parent leaders stepped forward as subcontractors, as partners, who were dynamic facilitators.
